The Curriculum

When planning our curriculum, we take into account the uniqueness of each child and their individual needs. Our pupils are encouraged to assist in the planning of new themes, promoting their Thinking Skills and Personal Capabilities. We assist children in achieving their potential and in making informed and responsible decisions throughout their time in Moneynick.





Foundation Stage

Foundation Stage is comprised of Year 1 & 2. There is great emphasis on play and outdoor learning. Children consolidate personal, social and emotional development during these early years. They are encouraged to form relationships with adults and other children and to develop their self-esteem and confidence. Teachers help pupils to become aware of the world beyond their immediate environment and to learn about others from a basis of tolerance, respect and open-mindedness.

With this in mind, we encourage sharing within our immediate classroom environment we sharing lessons with Duneane Primary. During shared lessons we encourage children to understand similarities and respect differences in our neighbour as well as our own classmates.



Key Stage 1&2

Key Stage 1 is comprised of Year 3 & 4 and Key Stage 2 is comprised of Year 5, 6 & 7. The learning areas of the curriculum taught in school are connected in as many ways as possible. Pupils need to be motivated to learn and they need to see the relevance of and connections, in what they are learning. We encourage pupils to become involved in the planning of themes, through a series of carousel activities at the beginning of each topic. This involves our pupils in 'what' they will learn and helps plan a tailored approach to 'how' they will learn it. It also provides specific learning opportunities for class teaching.









Blended Learning

Blended Learning takes place when the learning activity is structured to blend face-to-face teaching and learning with remote/online learning, using digital tools. At Moneynick Primary School we have a number of online platforms to consolidate, reinforce and enhance learning in school. Children have unique, individual passwords for each platform. Teachers set weekly tasks which are completed online. When necessary, communication between teachers and pupils can be facilitated on the online remote platforms. Pupil's online work is celebrated each month through remote learning certificates.







Skills for Life

Opportunities for life skills are built into many areas of our school planning. One example of this is Heart Start. During our annual Heart Start week in Term 3, our children learn Heart Start skills, from basic skills in Year 1 to CPR in Years 6 & 7.

The Cycling Proficiency Scheme is taught to our Year 6&7 pupils. The scheme teaches children who can already ride a bicycle, how to do so more safely. It covers what to wear, bicycle maintenance and rules of the road - an invaluable experience!











Accelerated Reader

In Years 4 to 7 we use the Accelerated Reader programme. Children take regular Star Reading Tests which level their reading. They choose from a range of levelled reading books to improve their independent reading. When they finish each book they take a quiz on an iPad, which provides them with points, feedback and an incentive to choose their next book. This programme keeps our pupils engaged with reading and is a valuable resource. Reading is also promoted through other school initiatives for example the School Book Fair and our Reindeer Read-a-thon.

Support for Educational Needs

We have a carefully devised system of screening to detect children who need support at the earliest opportunity. The Special Needs Co-ordinator SENCo works closely with teacher, pupil and classroom assistant to put in place a programme of reasonable adjustments. Under the SEN Code of Practice, communication between school and home is vital. We work in partnership with various outside agencies; RISE, the School Educational Psychology Service, the ASC and Literacy Support Service.

This year we were delighted to install two sensory circuits which are sequences of activities that helps pupils prepare for learning by alerting, organising and calming the senses




Home School Links

We hold annual parent-teacher meetings in October. During these meetings your child's progress is discussed and teachers will give good advice as to how you can help your child make further improvements. We report to parents in writing in the summer term by means of the Annual Report to Parents. Parents are free to contact the school at any time, to make an appointment to speak to their child's class teacher. We are happy to help.

Approach to Learning

Our teachers use different pedagogical approaches to give pupils a range of learning experiences. These include active learning methods, which are informed by Assessment for Learning strategies. Children learn best when a kinaesthetic teaching approach is taken and learning intentions are shared with them. They are given the opportunity to work independently, in pairs, in groups and as a class.

Through our strong partnership with parents, we encourage consolidation of class work in the form of suitable homework, which includes written Numeracy and Literacy, reading, spelling and mental maths.

ICT

Each class has use of iPads, laptops and computers, beebots, bluebots and Spheros, Micro-bits to develop their ICT skills. Pupils are encouraged to:

- handle and communicate information
- explore, express and exchange
- exchange and exhibit their work
- be creative through the use of film, animation and coding.














Positive Behaviour

They help to promote Children's Rights throughout the school and bring the concerns, issues and ideas of their peers to the principal, at regular meetings. Every classroom has a Charter, which the pupils have devised and all children are aware of the UNICEF Rights of the Child.

We have achieved our GAA 5 Star Centre Flag. Children continue to work on a daily basis improving skills in the following areas: Have a Ball, Fun & Run, Catch & Kick, Skill Challenge and Go Games.

Sports

We offer swimming to Year 6-7 pupils every week, all year round in Antrim Forum. We endeavour to ensure that our children leave Moneynick as competent swimmers and we celebrate their successes.

Children in Years 1 to 7 receive Gaelic football, soccer, Cross Country, handball, camogie and hurling training during the year from a range of coaches. We are committed to daily skills training through the GAA 5 Star Initiative.

Pupils attend Fun Days organised by Gaelic coaches which they enjoy. Footballers, handballers, camogs, hurlers and cross country runners participate in the Cumann na mBunscol Leagues and Competitions. We were recognised as the only Primary School finalist in the Local Women Sports School of the Year 2025.





Club School Links

Our School welcomes pupils who attend numerous GAA clubs spanning two counties. We encourage the ethos of a 'GAA Family' and promote our clubs successes, history and inspire their future. Our pupils send messages to players and management for finals, centenaries and club openings that encourage a continuity of community involvement between school and club.

We use our club facilities to empower our GAA codes and promote Cumann na mBunscol activities. Many club members volunteer their experience to inspire and disseminate their skills onto our pupils.

The Daily Mile

The Daily Mile was founded by Elaine Wyllie and aims to improve the health and well-being of children. The benefits they gain are physical, emotional and social, all from running, or jogging at their own pace, for 15 minutes daily.

Duneane and Moneynick: Partners in Learning were invited to attend Stranmillis University Belfast on Friday 14 February to present as the 'Priority Schools' for the launch of the Daily Mile in conjunction with the British Heart Foundation – Love your Heart Campaign. To prepare for the launch of The Daily Mile in Stranmillis, the Learning Partnership launched their our own 'Daily Mile' to build up pupils' confidence, resilience and endurance.

At Moneynick Primary School pupils continue to run, jog or walk the Daily Mile and participate in Athletics NI and Cross Country events. The Daily Mile also works in Partnership with Eco-Schools and Sustrans. Connecting learning is a key strength of our school.













Music, Dance & Drama

Children from Year 3 to 7 are provided with violin and guitar lessons and have the opportunity to complete music exams. Every year the school produces a Christmas Show and Saint Patrick's 'Ceol Agus Craic' Celebration in which all of our pupils take part.

Every year we engage with outside groups, such as the Centre Stage Production Company to provide a Drama Afterschool Club. During this club, children explore their creativity in Performing Arts through singing, dancing, acting and games.









Parish Links

We share close links with Duneane Parish and celebrate our Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Communion in Sacred Heart Church, Cargin. Our Parish Priest, Father James O'Reilly visits our school regularly.

Confirmation for Year 7 occurs in Term 2 and our school choir joins with the other primary school choirs for this occasion.



Charity Involvement

Every year we reach out to a number of charities. We feel this is an important element of Global Learning for our pupils and encourages empathy and respect for those who are less fortunate than us. The charities we are currently involved with are: Trócaire, St Vincent de Paul, Autism NI and Mary's Meals. Through our Grow in Love Religious programme and our themes in PDMU, there is further emphasis on loving our neighbours and our world.



















Education Today Awards

We are honoured to announce that Moneynick Primary School was awarded Creative School of the Year 2024 by the Education Today Awards. A mighty feat for a rural school, being recognised nationally from over 20,000 Primary Schools in the whole of the UK. Mrs McConway had the privilege of attending the prestigious Awards Ceremony as one of 5 finalists in the Grand Connaught Rooms, London on December 6th 2024. The judging panel described this category as thinking outside the box to achieve great teaching and learning through creative, innovative programmes. Spirit of Catholic Education Award

We were delighted to learn that we had been awarded with Distinction the Spirit of Catholic Education Award 2023-2024, the third consecutive year they we received this achievement. This year the award recognises our school's outstanding commitment Promoting Mental Health and Well Being through our Take 5 initiative and our school values. We had the honour to attend Saint Mary's University College, Belfast to receive our award in January 2025.

NAPCE Award

Our School was a finalist in the Pastoral Initiative Award in the National Awards for Pastoral Care in Education 2024/2025. We were extremely honoured to be recognised for the focus we place on pastoral care within our living ethos. Through the initiative of learning outdoors it promoted the physical and mental health of our pupils providing for them pastorally. Families First 'Inclusive School Community' Award

We were delighted to be presented with the Families First 'Inclusive School Community' Award. An accolade that captures our school's living ethos as identified as our area for dissemination during our recent Eti inspection: " the forging of a meaningful, wide-ranging community of learning which enriches the children's learning experiences and enhances their holistic development" Eti Inspection Report 2024. This award belongs to every member of our school family - a term we often use proudly, as our work is built on deep-rooted partnerships across our community. At Moneynick, we believe it takes a community to raise a child - and that's exactly what we do, together.

To enhance the collaboration with our community we partnered with the Northern Health and Social Care Trust, establishing a 'Tots & Tea, Baby and Me' Group in February 2025. A new adventure to broaden our school family, while connecting our community. Each week we welcomed families from across Antrim and Newtownabbey to weekly events, including baby massage, baby first aid, weaning and speech and language support. These informative sessions were led by social workers and the nursing team from the Northern Health and Social Care Trust.

The Outdoors

We have attractive grounds around our school. There is a front garden area for which the children are responsible. They take great pride in their garden. In the past, the school has won Shell Best Kept School as a result of efforts made by children, staff and parents. Children can get involved in the Gardening Club, where they can develop their ecological skills by learning how to grow and nurture plants and flowers. They can join our Forest Schools Club where they explore the outdoors using their senses, which is fundamental for encouraging creative, diverse and imaginative play. We have won awards at Garden Show Ireland for creative gardening design projects. We are also received our third Northern Ireland Eco-School Flag in May 2024.

Outdoor Learning

Outdoor learning improves children's health, engages them with learning and leads to a greater connection with nature. Play teaches critical life skills such as resilience, teamwork and creativity, but is central to children's enjoyment of their childhood. We partner with many organisations who facilitate opportunities to explore the outdoor classroom. Last year we achieved our third RSPB Wild Challenge for Schools Gold Award. An amazing achievement for our school.

Taking Outdoor Play Seriously Award

Play is natural and when you observe children at play, you will note it can be active, quiet, done in groups or whilst on your own. Play is an intrinsically motivated action, it is often an unplanned process in which thinking, feeling and doing can flourish. When children are playing, they can be inventive and creative; it is the most natural and open way children learn. Aside from the wide reaching benefits identified above, play is also therapeutic, it allows children to develop their inner resources and build resilience to cope with and make sense of the difficulties and uncertainties they experience through crisis situations.

We at Moneynick Primary School endeavour to ensure we provide our children with extensive outdoor play in our well resourced and spacious school yard. We have achieved The Taking Outdoor Play Seriously Accreditation presented by PlayboardNI during our school award ceremony. Another amazing achievement and strength of our school.

Summer Scheme

The annual Summer Scheme for P1-7 pupils runs during the first weeks of July. Activities allow for social and emotional development of our pupils and enhances their team work, thinking skills, friendships and active learning in a safe and secure environment.

















Roots of Empathy

Roots of Empathy is a specially designed programme, where through guided observation pupils discuss and label the baby's feelings and intentions, learning the affective aspect of empathy (emotion) and the cognitive aspect of empathy (perspective-taking). In Roots of Empathy, emotional literacy develops as pupils begin to identify and label the baby's feelings, reflect on and understand their own feelings, then bridge to understand the feelings of others. It helps pupils to understand how their behaviour or words can hurt others. This enables children to build connections and healthy relationships which leads to an understanding of their feelings and the ability to listen to the feelings of others.















Beyond Bricks

Our staff are trained to deliver the innovative Beyond Bricks Mindwise programme teaching key skills like emotional understanding and effective communication This engaging initiative focuses on helping children better understand their emotions, express themselves constructively, and build stronger relationships with peers.

Activities within the programme are designed to be both educational and enjoyable, blending creative problem-solving with interactive play. By fostering a supportive environment, Beyond Bricks empowers children to develop essential life skills while building their confidence.

Pupils prepare a celebratory assembly to showcase what they've learned. The event will bring together parents, teachers, and facilitators to applaud the children's achievements. Highlights include singing, storytelling and pupils' personal experiences.









Community Connections

For the past two years Moneynick Primary School have had a mutually beneficial relationship with our friends at Ard Na Grainde Residential Home. While their residents enjoy the songs, stories, crafts and games our visits bring our pupils learn the vital qualities of compassion, patience and understanding. Last year we partnered with Linking Generations NI for their Intergenerational Christmas PHA Campaign. We believed that this PDMU inspired provision for our pupils will empower and support the growth of an age-friendly society, creating pupils who are confident and compassionate members of our community.

Moneynick Primary School are proud to be the first school in the Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough

to adopt the new 'Kindness Postbox' community initiative.

This project will allow our school family to reinforce and consolidate our generational friendship with the staff and residents of Ard Na Grainde Residential Home, Randalstown.

The initiative encourages children, families and community members to write a cheerful letter, draw a picture or send an uplifting postcard and post them in the 'Kindness Postbox' from where they were delivered to residents in local care homes.

Meals Kitchen and are of good quality. Children take packed lunches or dinners in our school hall. They are encouraged to eat a healthy lunch, which should include a sandwich and fruit.

Allergies

Please be aware that there are children at our school with nut allergies. We recommend that your child's packed lunch should be nut free.

Wrap Around Care

For many years we have offered Wrap Around Care to the families of Moneynick. The Clubs are both stimulating and fun for our children.

Both Clubs operate term-time only.

Breakfast Club

Opening Hours: 7.45 to 8.45 am Monday to Friday

Children attending the Breakfast Club are encouraged to make their own breakfast and help with the washing-up. They can take part in activities such as puzzles, arts & crafts, monkey bars and outdoor play, weather depending. From time to time there are Breakfast Club fun mornings with treats provided, such as fill your own pancake or fruit kebabs.

After School Club

Opening Hours: 2.00 to 5.00pm Monday to Friday

The Afterschool Club provides our pupils with a healthy snack and plentiful activities. They can take part in Clubs such as Forest Schools, Gardening, Drama, Dance, Games, Art and Film Club. Children have access to the monkey bars in the school hall and when the weather is fine they play outdoors in the play park and school grounds. Annually, the Afterschool Club runs a Popcorn Party at Christmas time. This event is always well attended and lots of fun!
