Safer Internet Day

Safer Internet Day 2020 will be celebrated globally with the theme: Together for a better internet.

Co-ordinated in the UK by the UK Safer Internet Centre, Safer Internet Day is celebrated globally each year to promote the safe and positive use of digital technology for children and young people and inspire a national conversation.

It calls upon young people, parents, carers, teachers, social workers, law enforcement, companies, policymakers, and the wider community, to join in helping to create a better internet. We all must play a part!

Through internet safety lessons and videos, we will discuss with our P1-3 pupils how we can create an internet where we are....

• Free to be ourselves

Be proud of all the things that we enjoy and keep on trying different things too. If there are new activities that we want to do online, ask an adult first to help - to check they're ok.

• Free to be kind

Remember, the rules that we follow every day in real life also apply when we're on the internet. It's important to treat other people the way that you would like to be treated and always think about their feelings.

• Free to play

It's important that our parents and carers know what we enjoy doing online, so that they can help when we need it. Using the internet together as a family is fun.

• Free to be safe

Some parts of our identity must stay private. This is our 'personal information' - which includes our name, date of birth, home address, school address, email address and passwords.

• Free to talk

If anyone, or anything, online makes you feel worried, upset or uncomfortable, tell a trusted adult straight away. The sooner someone knows how you feel, the sooner you can be helped.

Our P4-7 lessons will focus on how we can create an internet where we are....

• Free to be creative

The internet is a great place to experiment with how to represent yourself. Whether that is using filters or emojis or giving your avatar wings and green hair in a game, remember to have fun and use the internet to release your inner creativity!

• Free to be different

The internet allows us to find more of the things we like or relate to, but it's also a place where we can learn about people who are different to us. The internet can be a great place to express the things that make you special or unique. Let's celebrate the fact that so many different people are using it!

Free to feel safe

Always keep your personal information safe online. There are lots of ways you can express yourself without giving this away. Remember that other people online may not always be who they appear to be, so be sure to check with an adult if you are ever unsure about what to share.

• Free to expect respect

If someone is treating you or your friends unkindly online, or not respecting you for who you are, you can use the block and report buttons to take positive action to stop it, and make sure you tell someone too.

Free to ask for help


If you are ever unsure about something you see online, or anything makes you feel worried, upset or confused then ask an adult that you trust for some help and advice.

'WEAR IT PINK' or 'WEAR IT BLUE'

On Tuesday 11 February we will celebrate World Cancer Day. World Cancer Day was established by the Paris Charter adopted at the World Summit Against Cancer (2000). The Charter promotes research for curing and preventing cancer, upgrading services provided to patients and the mobilisation of the global community against cancer. Through Rights Respecting Schools our pupils are learning about Article 24: You have the right to the best health care possible, safe water to drink, nutritious food, a clean and safe environment, and information to help you stay well. To promote Article 24 in Moneynick Primary School: we provide our pupils with a healthy break, water, daily exercise and information on how to stay well. We also have the responsibility to inform our pupils of how they can prevent disease and how others are researching to find cures to help our health. During 'Wear it Pink' or 'Wear it Blue' Day we encourage all pupils to wear pink or blue to show support for those who support cancer services and research. A contribution of £1 each would be greatly received and forwarded to Cancer Fund for Children from the pupils of Moneynick Primary School.
